Talmud Tractate Shabbos 127b:

A story is told of a man from Upper Galilee who hired himself out to an employer in the south for three years. On Erev Yom Kippur, the worker said to his employer, "Give me my wages so that I can go home to provide for my wife and children."

The employer answered, "I have no money."

"Then give me fruit," requested the worker.

"I have none," replied the employer.

"Give me property," suggested the worker.

"I don't have any."

"Give me pillows and blankets."

I don't have any."

Disheartened, the man slung his belongings over his shoulder and went home.

After Succos, the employer traveled to the home of the worker with the wages he owed him, along with three donkeys laden with food, drinks and an assorment of delicacies. They ate and drank and the employer gave the worker his wages. Then the employer asked: "When you asked for your wages and I told you that I didn't have the money, of what did you suspect me?

I thought that perhaps a very good business deal had come your way, a chance to buy merchandise cheaply, and that you had invested all your cash in this unusual opportunity."
